SERIES RECAP

For the past 1,800 years, millions upon millions of Christians worldwide have recited the Apostle's Creed as part of their corporate worship. Written shortly after the death of Christ, the Apostles' Creed summarizes foundational Christian beliefs. It is a helpful statement which unites the church, instructs the believer, protects against false doctrine, and points to a glorious God and what He desires for His people. Over the course of this series, we will explore the ancient creed together seeking to deepen ourselves in our ancient historic faith and, more importantly, in the God of our faith.

Let us read the Apostles Creed together to start the evening.

"I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth. I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of the virgin Mary. He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to hell. The third day he rose again from the dead. He ascended to heaven and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty. From there he will come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen."

PRAYER + SCRIPTURE

Open with a brief word of prayer: "God, we thank you for this time together. We open our hearts to how you might want to meet with us. Allow us to hear your voice and experience your work among us. Come Holy Spirit."

1-2 minutes of silent reflection.

Read 1 Corinthians 15:35-49

35 But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" 36 You foolish person! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. 37 And what you sow is not the body that is to be, but a bare kernel, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. 38 But God gives it a body as he has chosen, and to each kind of seed its own body. 39 For not all flesh is the same, but there is one kind for humans, another for animals, another for birds, and another for fish. 40 There are heavenly bodies and earthly bodies, but the glory of the heavenly is of one kind, and the glory of the earthly is of another. 41 There is one glory of the sun, and another glory of the moon, and another glory of the stars; for star differs from star in glory. 42 So is it with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable; what is raised is imperishable. 43 It is sown in dishonor; it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness; it is raised in power. 44 It is sown a natural body; it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a natural body, there is also a spiritual body. 45 Thus it is written, "The first man Adam became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. 46 But it is not the spiritual that is first but the natural, and then the spiritual. 47 The first man was from the earth, a man of dust; the second man is from heaven. 48 As was the man of dust, so also are those who are of the dust, and as is the man of heaven, so also are those who are of heaven. 49 Just as we have borne the image of the man of dust, we shall also bear the image of the man of heaven.

1-2 minutes of silent reflection.

Close with this short prayer: ". Jesus, we look to you for everlasting life. You lived here among us, died the death we deserved, then was raised to eternal life with the Father. Spirit, help us grow to live our lives knowing that in Jesus, we too can expect everlasting life with the Father when Jesus returns. Amen."

As you reflect on 1 Corinthians 15:35-49 what is the Holy Spirit showing or teaching you?

SERMON DISCUSSION

Let's have a discussion around these main points from Sunday's teaching:

BECAUSE JESUS ROSE, SO WILL WE

In the sermon, we heard that the resurrection is not an 'if', it's just a 'when'. Such a supernatural thing can be expected because Jesus was resurrected into life everlasting. And because Jesus was resurrected from the dead, we can expect the same if we trust in Him. If we believe Jesus rose, we can trust that we will rise with Him.

How does Jesus' resurrection grow your confidence that you too will live after death?

THE RESURRECTION OF THE BODY

Paul addresses the question "But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" by drawing our attention to Christ. In His resurrection, we see four things:

- Jesus had a body (He showed His wounds, John 20:20)
- Jesus' body was recognizable. (He was called by name, John 20:16)
- Jesus ate food. (Luke 24:42)
- Jesus' body was physical, but beyond-physical (He entered a locked room, John 20:26)

How is the resurrection of Jesus' body an encouragement to you for the next life?

LIFE EVERLASTING

When we are raised from the dead we will be raised in bodies that cannot die. This is what the Bible calls Glorification. At the coming of Christ sin and death our bodies will be resurrected and perfected. Redemption will be complete! And this is our ultimate hope, that one day, all things will be made perfect, and we will be with God forever.

How does belief in the resurrection and life everlasting bring you ultimate hope in the things to come?

SERIES PRACTICE

One of our key discipleship values as a church is that of practice. Moving forward, we are going to begin emphasizing one of our key spiritual practices during each sermon series. This practice is meant to coincide with the theme of the series, and something we invite our church to practice as a part of their spiritual formation.

During the Apostles Creed series, we are emphasizing the practice of Scripture. Getting into God's Word and getting God's Word into us is vital for helping form our doctrine and fuel our discipleship.

Spend some time before you close talking about what group members are reading, and how you can press into Scripture as a group this summer.

CLOSING PRAYER

Pray over what was shared in the discussion, for your group to be united in the gospel, and for help from the Holy Spirit to be shaped to be more like Jesus as we put God's ways into practice.
